
Doynton Parish Pump

Wick Football Club

Over the last few weeks the football club has been battered by rain, but we have still managed to play several games. Let's hope February is not such a wash out and the ground has time to recover

WICK's ambitious boss Mike Strawford is eyeing a prized first for his club after safely negotiating a tricky Christmas confrontation in the shape of their big Marcliff Gloucestershire County League rivals. A late strike by local boy, Mike Hardiman, was sufficient to see third-placed Wick past relentless leaders Frampton United 1-0 on their Bell Field travels to book a berth in the semi-finals of the Les James League Cup. The Oldbury Lane outfit were still waiting, at the time this article was penned, to see how the rest of the last-eight shake-up panned out. AEK Boco ran out winners against Patchway on January 11, whilst the Broadwell Amateurs-Gala Wilton tie, and Sharpness-Ruardean Hill Rangers encounter, were scheduled for the following Saturday, January 18 (both 2pm).

Wick always knew they had their hands full up against a Frampton side who have shown themselves to be a consistent force amongst the County League frontrunners over many seasons. However Hardiman's strike five minutes from time, as he fastened on to a through pass from Danny Sheldon and calmly dispatched it past stranded keeper Peter Davies into the bottom left corner from the goalscorer's perspective, earned the visitors a notable victory, their second of the season over Frampton following a 3-2 October home league win, and kept them on course for a first-ever success in the league's knock-out tournament. Strawford smiled: "It was brilliant as we'd been struggling with injuries before and during the game when our lads were dropping like flies. We really were carrying two or three players by the end of it. "Then you had lads like Danny Sheldon coming on with about 15 minutes to go and being involved in the goal having been only too pleased to have been put on the bench to start with following a work's Christmas bash the night before. Wildflowers in the churchyard



It's lovely to see how the things that were planted last year have survived the rigours of winter - there is a lot to look forward to, this coming season. The hellebores and red campion are doing well in the shade of the tower, and I expect to see lots of bluebells in May.

The digging of the soakaway test hole, whilst at first looking quite catastrophic (there are wild orchids there) may actually prove to be a bit of an

opportunity, as the red poppies we know from Remembrance events need light and disturbed soil to germinate, so fingers crossed, eh?

There will be a "Tidying and Planting" day fairly soon, if any volunteers are interested in coming along for an hour and a cup of tea whilst leaning on a garden fork - watch this space for details.
