There are times when we don't realise how much we value something until we haven't got it.

Several times since moving to Wick I have locked myself out of our home. You can hold a key in the palm of your hand and never give it a thought till it is on the wrong side of a locked door. Then you are stuck. Everything you want is on the other side of the door and you can't get it till, in my case, my wife comes home, or thankfully a neighbour can help me.

Over a year ago the Covid pandemic spread round the world like a cloak of darkness, taking from us our most basic need to show compassion and love through human touch. We have been separated by closed doors, by masks, or at best by a two-meter gap. We have hated it and discovered how much we value human contact. A handshake, a hug, a touch on the arm, or just to walk alongside and share time is far more valuable than we ever realised.

There are other ways in which we can separate ourselves form each other. We can hold anger and bitterness that builds walls between us. We can be too focused on our work or our leisure activities to give time to the person who can be in the same room but may as well be a hundred miles away. We can hold prejudices that separate. In reaction we should affirm that, Black lives matter, the LGBTQ+ community matter, the rights and respect of women matter...

So much can separate us but there is hope of a new dawn if we would learn what to value. We are made in the image of God who values us as friends. At Easter we remember, "There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends." In love for us Jesus was crucified. He took what separates us, paid the price, and defeated it. He died, but three days later Jesus rose again victorious over death, giving us hope of better things to come, even of life after death.

Faith is him gives us purpose and meaning and hope for a better world. I pray we will learn what to value and step forward into better things with God's help.

Brian Mumford has been an integral part of this church for so long, that it seems impossible to imagine it without him. Over the last few months, as Brian became progressively more poorly, we realised just how much he and Monica were responsible for. SO many people have said "Oh, Brian takes care of that" or "We should ask Brian" almost daily! He will be very much missed.

My own little Venn diagram of "Things that happen in Church/Things that I am involved with/Things that Brian and Monica organise" has a massive overlap, including; the choir - Brian has been with us in spirit for a while, and it is not the same without him; Open Door - my Mum used to enjoy the outings very much, which Brian and Monica organised so well it looked effortless, and he was always very appreciative whenever I did the Thought For The Day (he could also be relied upon to produce a Thought For The Day at a moment's notice, if the person doing it did not turn up - quite a skill!); Intercessory Prayers - his prayers were always meaningful and thought provoking, and he kept an extremely useful book of Intercessions tucked in his choir stall, which meant if one were asked to do them at short notice, he was the person one turned to; and of course, the magazine - I still consider myself Brian's Assistant, he was SO helpful and a source of much information and experience when I took on the editing, and he and Monica were responsible for all of the distribution/delivery side of things. But there were lots of other jobs that Brian took on that had nothing to do with me - he liaised with the Vicar and the Organist to choose the hymns every week, for instance. His voice on our PCC was always one of thoughtfulness and care. Between them, he and Monica, quietly beavering away, kept the church running smoothly for many, many years. His massive experience, particularly of being Churchwarden and PCC member, and his quiet, but very deep, faith benefited all of us, in many different ways.

Our hearts go out to Monica, and all the family. He was so proud of them all. I still remember the look of such love and pride on his face as his two smallest grandsons charmed the entire congregation one day; he attempted to be nonchalant about it, but failed miserably. It was also very noticeable when he talked about any of his family, every time! We shall miss his wisdom and counsel.

More reminiscences of the Second World War, this time from David Vaudrey:

The night the bomb fell – When my father was posted from Larkhill, near Salisbury, to Malta in 1940, our family moved to Ferndown, a sprawling village surrounded by heathland, between Ringwood, Wimborne and Bournemouth. In 1944 the household comprised my mother, my brother Denis, then aged 16, our nanny, Cissie, and my twin sister, Gillian and myself, aged nine. Our other brother, Derek, 20, was away, having joined the Royal Artillery, his father's regiment.

On April 23rd that year, St. George's Day, I woke up in the night feeling as if someone had tipped a bucket of gravel over me. Cissie came into our room and told me to get dressed. In the dark, I put both feet down one leg of my short trousers so I wasn't able to walk properly and, later, when my mother saw me hobbling, she thought I had been badly injured. Cissie led us downstairs.

My mother had woken up hearing thumps on the roof. Thinking there might be incendiary bombs up there, she went downstairs to wake Denis with a view to putting out fires with the pathetic little stirrup pump that all households were issued with. As she reached his room the bomb exploded. Plaster fell from the walls and ceilings, filling the floors with rubble. The staircase was like a scree and she could not climb back up. My sister and I sheltered under the dining room table until the danger seemed to have passed and then beds were made for us on the sofa and armchairs.

In the morning we saw that the bomb had landed in the lane leading to the house, leaving an enormous crater and cutting off the water and electricity. The house was in a dreadful state; it had been built using lime mortar and many of the bare walls bulged dangerously, still with pictures hanging from the rails. I don't remember feeling in the least frightened – in fact, it was all rather exciting.

Gillian and I were taken to stay with friends for a few days before being taken by Denis by train to stay with an aunt near Manchester, on his way back to school. As we were away for three months, we attended a school there for a term. By the time we got back, my mother had rented a bungalow where we stayed for about a year while the house was being repaired. We all went back to the house each day to look after the chickens and the ducks that my mother kept.

You might have seen some work going on in the nature reserve this past month. The local council have sent in some contractors to fell some dangerous Ash trees suffering from ash dieback, and following our usual annual coppicing cycle. (see https://ashdieback.co.uk/)

The Friends Group have been applying for funding to help fund future projects in the nature reserve and the ongoing maintenance cycle.

We are currently meeting via Zoom on the last Thursday of each month. Please come and join us for our next meeting, we need more local people to join the team and represent the views from people in the village about what happens to this most valuable of habitats and community spaces.

Plans to turn a former quarry into an outdoor activity centre are set to be discussed by South Gloucestershire Council.

The proposals which, if passed, would see Wick quarry host activities such as paddle boarding, kayaking, archery and axe throwing.

A launch platform and floating pontoons would also be built, to allow the lake to become an open water swimming centre.

A change of use application has been submitted for the site, by UK Active Outdoors, in partnership with Battle Archery.

The plans have attracted 118 comments, with some people raising concerns around traffic management and access issues.

If the proposals get the go ahead, the outdoor centre could open this summer.

Illegal Hare Coursing

Incidents of hare coursing have recently been observed on farmland adjoining Burbarrow Lane in Hinton. Hare coursing is an illegal bloodsport where dogs (typically lurchers) are used to chase, catch and kill hares. If you see hare coursing taking place, you should contact the police on 101. Hare coursers should not be approached as they can turn violent. However, if it is safe to do so, a note should be taken of any details which may be of use to the police e.g. number/description of men and dogs involved and the number plates of any vehicles suspected of belonging to the coursers. Vehicles used will be estate cars, four wheel drives or vans. If firearms are visible, please dial 999.




